

FACULTY BIOS

ADINA ALLEN

Rabbi Adina Allen, a spiritual leader, writer and educator believes that creativity exists within each and every one of us, regardless of perceived skill or talent, and that creativity is a vital resource in the work of social change. Adina is co-founder and Creative Director of Jewish Studio Project (JSP), a nationally recognized Jewish learning organization that brings together practices from the beit midrash (house of Jewish study) with a powerful approach from the field of art therapy. Integrating a lifetime of experience in the expressive arts with her rabbinic training, Adina created JSP's unique learning methodology as a practice for expanding empathy and resilience, supporting the work of dismantling oppression, and drawing forth from our sacred texts new and vital narratives, insights and images. Adina was ordained by Hebrew College in 2014 where she was a Wexner Graduate Fellow.

ANN GARRIDO

Ann Garrido is a Consultant with Triad Consulting Group and an Associate Professor of Homiletics at Aquinas Institute of Theology in St. Louis, Missouri where she has taught leadership, conflict management, and communications, in addition to other courses. Ann is the author of eight books including two on supervision, focused on walking the talk of your convictions and management focused on service to others. Her current writing project deals with questions related to truth and social media. Ann first became passionate about healthy approaches to conflict management in 1990 after a six-month period in Sierra Leone on the eve of the country's civil war. Since then, she has taught and lectured on Difficult Conversations and Feedback in such diverse environments as Catholic Relief Services, Olin School of Business at Washington University, The Wexner Foundation, and Commerce Bank. Ann has also spent a significant amount of time working on the Rocky Boy Reservation in northern Montana. She once had a fistfight break out amongst participants outside her Difficult Conversations course, but maintains that this simply enriched the discussion.

MONICA GIANNONE

Monica Giannone is the Director of the Negotiation and Conflict Resolution Collaboratory at Harvard Kennedy School, where she is also an Instructor and teaches two negotiation courses for graduate students. The Collaboratory's work seeks to innovate at the intersection of negotiation and public leadership by bringing together academics and scholars with frontline negotiators to produce research, trainings and workshops, and increase the capacity of public leaders to better negotiate, overcome difficult situations, and collaborate across difference. Monica is also an Adjunct Lecturer in the Management Division at Babson College and teaches negotiation in the MBA program. Monica's current areas of work focus on international climate negotiations, overcoming partisan divide in U.S. legislatures, negotiation in cities and local government, value-based conflict, situations of low-power, and gender and negotiation. Monica graduated from Harvard Kennedy School with an MPP and concentration in Management, Leadership, and Decision Making and from Wake Forest University with a BA in Political Science and Religious Studies, where she graduated Phi Beta Kappa.

FACULTY BIOS

DAVID INGBER

Rabbi David A. Ingber is the Founder and Senior Rabbi at Romemu, NYC, a community he founded in 2008 that today has over 700 households. A disciple of Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi, famed founder of the Jewish Renewal movement, David was ordained by "Reb Zalman" in 2004. David serves on faculty for the Wexner Heritage Program, The Shalom Hartman Institute of North America and Israel, The 92nd Street Y's program for Rabbinic Entrepreneurship, and other institutions. He was an AJWS Global Justice Fellow, as well as a Rabbinic Fellow in the Shalom Hartman Institute's Rabbinic Leadership Initiative. David has lectured extensively on the topics of spirituality, theology, Jewish mysticism, prayer and meditation. He lives in Manhattan with his amazing wife Ariel and their three children, Baer, Tal, and Or.

MICHELLE LYNN-SACHS

Dr. Michelle Lynn-Sachs founded Spotlight Consulting & Coaching, which supports Jewish organizations through customized leadership development, professional coaching and strategic consulting. Michelle started her career as a congregational educator in one of North America's largest synagogues, then turned her attention to developing leaders for the Jewish community. She has served on the faculty at the Jewish Theological Seminary and Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion and is an alumna of Brown University, HUC-JIR, New York University and the Wexner Graduate Fellowship. Michelle lives in Austin, Texas with her family.
